LEAGUE OF NATIONS NEAR COLLAPSE AS ITALY WALKS OUT ON SESSION IN HUFF.

Hurricane Roars Thru Florida Keys  
Taking Toll of 1000 Dead and Hurt

British Cabinet on 24-hour Call As  
War Threat Holds Europe in Tension.

WORLD CALAMITY

HINGES ON LEAGUE  
NATIONS FAILURE.

Collapse of the League of Nations seemed certain as a result of yesterday's hectic proceedings when Italy walked out on the conclave after a stormy session. Members of the British Cabinet are on 24-hour call in readiness for any emergency. Mussolini has called 50,000 more troops to the colors. "Ethiopia is a world outlaw and Italy will do as she pleases." Such was Italy's terse warning to the League when it met Wednesday, in a final effort to avert war against Abyssinia. It is the opinion of leading statesmen that failure of the League to solve the present crisis will result in its complete collapse and a world calamity.

HURRICANE TAKES  
HEAVY TOLL IN  
FLORIDA AREA.

A hurricane which screamed out of the Caribbean last Sunday at 85 miles an hour swept thru the Florida Keys and lower islands, leaving behind a wake of death and desolation. Survey estimates yesterday place the death list at 1000. A Miami paper counts 700 dead, 429 injured and 300 missing. The storm is reported moving thru Georgia and into South Carolina. All shipping is at a standstill while planes are working overtime rushing aid and supplies to the stricken areas. Two F. E. R. A. camps were completely wiped out. The National Guard and the Red Cross are doing everything possible to relieve the sufferers and bring a measure of solace and stability out of the chaos. The twister hit Tampa, Florida at 2. a. m. Wednesday, causing damage estimated at a million dollars. (See page 5 for additional radio news.)

# Electors of Yukon

Having decided, in response to a general invitation from electors in all parts of the Yukon, to run as an Independent Liberal candidate in the coming election of a member from the Yukon to the House of Commons of Canada, I wish to place before the electors the policy that I shall follow if I have the honour of being elected as their representative.

Percy Hubbard, partner of Art Heinz in Service Airlines of Fairbanks, his brother Russell and a friend by the name of Douglas lie critically ill in a Fairbanks hospital as a result of a bad crash near the Chena river early last week. Week ago Tuesday Hubbard hopped off to continue search for his partner Heinz, lost since taking off from Dawson Aug. 19. Pilot Munson located Hubbard's distress signal, made out of willow branches. The rescue pilot was able to take Russell Hubbard and Douglas into Fairbanks but Percy was so badly hurt that it was necessary to fly a doctor back from Fairbanks before the crippled flier could be removed.
