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CHAPTER 1

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND "THE FUR EXPORT TAX ORDINANCE."

(Assented to April 20, 1933.)

The Commissioner of the Yukon Territory, by and with the advice and consent of the Council of said Territory, enacts as follows:

(1)

"The Fur Export Tax Ordinance," being Chapter 8 of the Ordinances of 1919, is hereby amended by striking out the word "ten" in the third line of Section 8 thereof, and substituting in lieu thereof the word "five"; and by adding immediately after the word "Secretary," in the fifth line thereof, the words "and the Territorial Agents at Whitehorse and Mayo."

CHAPTER 2

AN ORDINANCE TO REPEAL "AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR A BOUNTY ON WOLVES AND COYOTES."

(Assented to April 20, 1933.)

The Commissioner of the Yukon Territory, by and with the advice and consent of the Council of said Territory, enacts as follows:

(1)

wolves and
coyotes
repealed.

"An Ordinance to Provide for a Bounty on Wolves and Coyotes," being Chapter 3 of the Ordinances of 1929, is hereby repealed. The Commissioner may, nevertheless, pay bounty on any skins delivered to a duly appointed agent of the Government on or before 1st August, 1933.

CHAPTER 3

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND "THE YUKON GAME ORDINANCE."

(Assented to April 20, 1933.)

The Commissioner of the Yukon Territory, by and with the advice and consent of the Council of said Territory, enacts as follows:

(1)

"The Yukon Game Ordinance," being Chapter 1 of the Ordinances of 1920, and Amendments thereto, is hereby amended by adding, immediately after sub-section (7) of Section 2 of the said Ordinance, the following:

(8) "Resident" shall mean any British subject who has resided in the Yukon Territory not less than one year with the intention of making his permanent home therein, or any person not a British subject who has resided in the Yukon Territory not less than two years with the intention of making his permanent home therein.

(9) Any game unless being the holder of a valid and subsisting license or permit issued pursuant to this Ordinance.

10-C. The General Game Hunter's license fee for a resident of the Territory shall be \$1.00; and the General Game Hunter's license fee for a non-resident of the Territory shall be \$5.00.

The said Ordinance is further amended by inserting immediately after the figures "\$100.00" in the thirteenth line of sub-section (1) of Section 10 thereof the following:
"in the case of a non-resident who is not a British subject, and \$75.00 in the case of a non-resident British subject."

The said Ordinance is further amended by inserting immediately after the word "hunting" in the second line of sub-section 10-b thereof, the following:
"moose, caribou, deer, mountain sheep, mountain goat or bear."

CHAPTER 4

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND "THE POLL TAX ORDINANCE."

(Assented to April 20, 1933.)

The Commissioner of the Yukon Territory, by and with the advice and consent of the Council of said Territory, enacts as follows:

(1)

"The Poll Tax Ordinance," being Chapter 1 of the Ordinances of the Yukon Territory, 1918, is hereby amended by striking out the word "ten" in the third line of Section 12 thereof, and substituting therefor the word "five."

CHAPTER 5

AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE CANCELLATION OF CERTAIN ASSESSMENTS MADE UNDER "THE ASSESSMENT ORDINANCE."

(Assented to April 20, 1933.)

The Commissioner of the Yukon Territory, by and with the advice and consent of the Council of said Territory, enacts as follows:

(1)

All assessments under "The Assessment Ordinance," being Chapter 5, Consolidated Ordinances of the Yukon Territory, in respect of income, personal property, lands and improvements in the City of Dawson, made prior to 1st January, 1927, the taxes or rates on which are now outstanding and uncollected, and so appear on the Tax Roll of the said City of Dawson, are hereby cancelled.

CHAPTER 6

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND "THE MOTOR VEHICLE ORDINANCE."

(Assented to April 20, 1933.)

The Commissioner of the Yukon Territory, by and with the advice and consent of the Council of said Territory, enacts as follows:

(1)

"The Motor Vehicle Ordinance," being Chapter 66, Consolidated Ordinances of the Yukon Territory, is hereby amended by striking out Section 11 thereof, and by substituting therefor the following:

11. Every motor vehicle in use on public highways, excepting motorcycles, motor bicycles and such motor vehicles as are properly equipped with one light in forward centre of such motor vehicle, shall, at all times after dusk and before dawn, display two or more white or tinted lights, other than red, on the forward part of said vehicle, so placed as to be seen from the front, and of sufficient illuminating power to be visible at a distance of five hundred (500) feet in the direction in which displayed, and to reveal any persons, vehicle or substantial object seventy-five (75) feet ahead of the lamps. Such motor vehicle, other than a caterpillar, when in use shall also display on the rear a lamp so constructed and placed as to show a red light from the rear. Motorcycles, motor bicycles and motor vehicles equipped with one light, as herein provided, shall display on the forward part one white or tinted light, as aforesaid, and a red light to the rear; PROVIDED, that the operator of any motor vehicle may proceed in a cautious and careful manner, in the event of a failure of one or more of his

lights to operate, toward his destination, but he shall take the first reasonable opportunity to put his lights in order, otherwise be deemed guilty of violation of this provision. It shall be unlawful to use on a vehicle of any kind operated on public highways, including motorcycles, any lighting device of over four (4) candle-power, equipped with a reflector, unless the same shall be so designed or arranged that no rays of light shall be projected upward, or above the level of the headlight centre; **AND PROVIDED FURTHER**, that no headlight shall be capable of projecting its rays higher than forty-two (42) inches from the level surface on which the vehicle stands under all conditions of load. If, in addition to headlights, any auxiliary light, projecting lights, or devices other than the rear lamp, such auxiliary light or lights shall be subject to all the restrictions of this section, regarding direction of the beam. If a spotlight is used on a motor vehicle, it shall be unlawful for any person to direct its rays toward the eyes of the driver or occupants of any approaching vehicle, or to the left of the centre of the travelled way when meeting another vehicle. No person shall operate a motor vehicle on any highway equipped with an electric bulb or other lighting device of a greater capacity than twenty-one (21) candle-power, no matter how the same may be shaded, covered or obscured. No person shall turn all or any of his motor vehicle's lights off for the purpose of avoiding arrest or identification.

The said Ordinance is further amended by inserting immediately after Section 23 thereof the following section:

23-A. Before turning, stopping, or changing the course on the highway of any motor vehicle, and before turning such vehicle when starting the same, it shall be the duty of the operator thereof first to ascertain whether there is sufficient space for such movement to be made in safety, and the operator shall give a signal plainly visible to the operators of other vehicles of his intention to turn, stop, or change his course. Such signal shall be given either by the use of the hand and arm or by the use of an approved mechanical or electrical device.

When the signal required by this regulation is given by the use of the hand and arm the intention to turn the motor vehicle toward the left shall be indicated by extending the hand and arm horizontally from and beyond the left side of the motor vehicle; the intention to turn to the right shall be indicated by extending the hand and arm vertically with the hand pointing upward out from the left side of the motor vehicle; when the signal to be given is to indicate the intention to stop a motor vehicle or abruptly or suddenly to check its speed, it shall be given by extending the hand and arm out from and beyond the left side of the motor vehicle and pointed in a downward direction.

Use of hand and arm in signalling.

When such signal is given by means of a device, it shall only be given by an adequate device which has been approved by the Commissioner.

Signalling devices.

No person shall sell or offer for sale such a device until it has been approved by the Commissioner.

CHAPTER 7

AN ORDINANCE FOR GRANTING TO THE COMMISSIONER CERTAIN SUMS OF MONEY TO DEFRAY THE EXPENSES OF THE PUBLIC SERVICE OF THE TERRITORY AND THE CITY OF DAWSON.

(Assented to April 20, 1933.)

Whereas, It appears by Message from George Allen Jeckell, Esquire, the Comptroller of the Yukon Territory, and in the Supplementary Estimates accompanying the same, that the sums hereinafter mentioned in Schedule "A" are required to defray certain further expenses of the Public Service of the Yukon Territory and the City of Dawson, and for the purposes relating thereto for the year ended March 31, 1933; and,

Whereas, It appears by Message from George Allen Jeckell, Esquire, the Comptroller of the Yukon Territory, and in the Estimates accompanying the same, that the sums hereinafter mentioned in Schedule "B" to this Ordinance are required to defray certain expenses of the Public Service of the Yukon Territory and for the purposes relating thereto for the twelve months ending March 31, 1934; and,

Whereas, It appears by Message from George Allen Jeckell, Esquire, the Comptroller of the Yukon Territory, and in the Estimates accompanying the same, that the sums hereinafter mentioned in Schedule "C" to this Ordinance are required to defray certain expenses of the Public Service of the City of Dawson and for the purposes relating thereto for the twelve months ending March 31, 1934;

The Commissioner of the Yukon Territory, by and with the advice and consent of the Council of said Territory, therefore enacts as follows:

1. From and out of the sums at the disposal of the Yukon Council there shall be paid and applied a further sum not exceeding in the whole one hundred and twenty-seven thousand nine hundred and twenty-two dollars and ninety-three cents for defraying the several charges and expenses of the Public Service of the Yukon Territory for the year ending March 31, 1933, as set forth in Schedule "A" of this Ordinance; and from and out of the sums at the disposal of the Yukon Council there shall be paid and applied a further sum not exceeding in the whole one thousand four hundred and seventy-two dollars and forty-eight cents for defraying the several charges and expenses of the Public Service of the City of Dawson for the year ended March 31, 1933, as set forth in Schedule "A" of this Ordinance.

2. From and out of the funds at the disposal of the Yukon Council there shall and may be paid and applied a sum not exceeding in the whole one hundred and fifty-eight thousand seven hundred and six dollars and twenty cents for defraying the several charges and expenses of the Public Service of the Yukon Territory for the twelve months ending March 31, 1934, as set forth in Schedule "B" of this Ordinance.

3. From and out of the funds at the disposal of the Yukon Council there shall and may be paid and applied a sum not exceeding thirty thousand and five hundred dollars for defraying the several charges and expenses of the Public Service of the City of Dawson for the twelve months ending March 31, 1934, as set forth in Schedule "C" to this Ordinance.

4. The due application of all moneys expended shall be duly accounted for.

5. In the event of there being a surplus of moneys standing to the credit of any item voted for Roads, Bridges and Public Works after the construction or repairs provided for have been completed to the satisfaction of the Superintendent of Works and Buildings, such surplus of moneys shall forthwith on the acceptance of such works or repairs by the Commissioner of the Yukon Territory, be taken from said item and become part of and be added to the amount provided for Contingencies to such Roads, Bridges and Public Works, and shall thereafter be at the disposal of the Commissioner of the Yukon Territory for Roads, Bridges and Public Works.

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
